

Gerald Sousa (Artistic Director) has held the position of BCS Artistic Director since 1989. Dr. Sousa received his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and his doctorate in Choral Conducting, summa cum laude, from Indiana University. He has held positions at the University of New Orleans, Dartmouth College, and the University of North Carolina, and has performed professionally at the Aspen Summer Music Festival. Dr. Sousa is currently Director of Music at St. Mark's United Methodist Church in Bloomington, and is active as

an arts advocate and technology consultant. He has served on the boards of local arts organizations, including the former Bloomington Area Arts Council, which he led as President for a number of years.



Paul Pisano (Assistant Conductor) holds master's and doctoral degrees in piano performance from the College-Conservatory of Music at the University of Cincinnati. At Kenyon College and Iowa State University, Dr. Pisano taught piano performance, music theory, ear training, keyboard harmony, and Italian language, while serving as faculty accompanist and music director for opera/musical theatre workshops. He has been a staff pianist at the Opera and Music Theatre Festival of Lucca (Italy) and the Utah

Festival Opera Company. Since moving to Bloomington, he has been a frequent collaborator and independent vocal coach for graduate and undergraduate voice majors at the Jacobs School of Music and has begun a second career as a published composer and arranger.




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Welcome (continued)
